

NBI Canadian Core Plus Bond Fund Series F

What does the fund invest in?

The fund's investment objective is to provide a high level of income and sustained capital growth. The fund invests directly, or indirectly through investments in securities of other mutual funds or through the use of derivatives, in a diversified portfolio composed mainly of fixed-income securities of Canadian issuers with various maturities and credit ratings. It is expected that investments in foreign securities will not exceed approximately 30% of the fund's net assets.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on March 31, 2024. The fund's investments will change over time.

How risky is it?

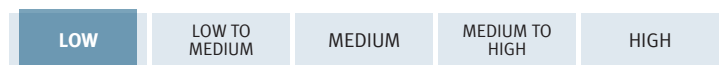
The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money. One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

NBI has rated the volatility of this fund as **low**.

Because this is a new fund, the risk rating is only an estimate by NBI. Generally, the rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with low risk rating can still lose money.

No guarantees

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the money you invest.

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Series F units of the fund have performed since inception. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This section tells you how Series F units of the fund have performed in past calendar years. However, this information is not available because the fund has not yet completed a calendar year.

Best and worst 3-month returns

This section shows the best and worst returns for the Series F units of the fund in a 3-month period. However, this information is not available because the fund has not yet completed a calendar year.

Average return

This section shows the value and annual compounded rate of return of a hypothetical \$1,000 investment in Series F units of the fund. However, this information is not available because the fund has not yet completed 12 consecutive months.

Who is this fund for?

Investors who:

- are looking to invest their money for the medium term (at least three years);
- wish to add a source of interest income to their portfolio;
- are looking for an investment that provides both income and growth.

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws where you live and whether or not you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) or a Tax-Free Savings Account (TFSA).

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Series F units of the fund. The fees and expenses – including any commissions – can vary among series of the fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales Charges

You pay your representative's firm an annual fee based on the asset value of your account instead of paying commissions or fees on each purchase.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund's returns. As of December 31, 2023, the fund's expenses were of its value. This equals for every \$1,000 invested.

More about the trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and/or advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

NBI does not pay any trailing commission to your representative's firm with respect to Series F units.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell, switch or convert securities of the fund.

| Fee | What you pay |
|------------------------|--|
| Short-term trading fee | 2% of the value of the securities you redeem or switch within 90 days of purchase may be charged by NBI. This fee goes to the fund. |
| Fee-based account fee | The Series F is only offered to investors who have entered into an agreement to pay fees directly to their representative's firm. These investors pay their representative's firm annual compensation based on the asset value of their account. |
| Other fees | Registered Account termination fee, only if the registered investment account is with NBI. \$100 |

What if I change my mind?

Under the securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual fund units within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document; or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the time limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
