Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended June 30, 2024, the Meritage Growth Plus Income Portfolio's Advisor Series units returned 4.26% compared to 7.01% for the Portfolio's blended benchmark. The broad-based index, the Morningstar Canada Large-Mid Index (CAD), returned 6.36%. Unlike the indices, the Portfolio's performance is calculated after fees and expenses. Please see the *Past Performance* section for the returns of all of the Portfolio's series, which may vary mainly because of fees and expenses.

The Portfolio's net asset value dropped by 2.73% over the period, from \$74.13 million as at December 31, 2023 to \$72.10 million as at June 30, 2024.

The first half of 2024 was characterized by a bull market for stocks, with marked outperformance by the S&P 500, itself driven by its technology giants which spark optimism regarding advances in artificial intelligence. On the other hand, the period proved less buoyant for bonds which ended little changed.

Specifically, U.S. equities (S&P 500) posted a performance largely attributable to the technology stocks. Internationally, emerging markets rebounded, while the EAFE developed countries equity index grew, similar to Canada, with the S&P/TSX.

Within fixed income, inflation volatility has proven constraining for the asset class, with markets revising downward their outlook for interest rate cuts by the influential U.S. Federal Reserve. Thus, after a more difficult start to the year, Canadian bonds finally recovered thanks to a first rate cut by the Bank of Canada, ending the half-year almost unchanged.

Among commodities, oil experienced a rebound in recent months and ended higher, while gold was volatile, but also ended the period with an appreciation. Finally, on the currency side, the U.S. dollar appreciated against the Canadian dollar and the euro, driven by a Federal Reserve, that is increasingly on its own with a monetary policy that has yet to be eased.

Given this context, the Meritage Growth Plus Income Portfolio underperformed its blended benchmark over the period. The AGF American Growth Fund and the Capital Group Global Equity Fund brought the most value to the Portfolio during the period. The CI Canadian Bond Fund, and the TD Canadian Core Plus Bond Fund contributed the least value to the Portfolio's overall return over the period.

Recent Developments

Since the start of the year, economic news has generally been better than expected, with, among other things, a recovery in global manufacturing activity and sustained consumer spending in the United States. And while the fog is still dense on the inflation front, the latest news has been more encouraging, prompting the Bank of Canada to cut its benchmark interest rate for the first time since 2020, and the Federal Reserve to maintain its intention to do the same later in the year.

Consequently, with inflation closing in on the landing strip, the next 6 to 12 months are likely to be a moment of truth in terms of the U.S. economy's ability to continue to demonstrate such resilience. As such, we'll need to keep a close eye on the evolution of consumer spending and, ultimately, the resilience of the job market, which could be challenged later this year. Nevertheless, in the shorter term, the fact that the Fed Chairman is keeping the door open to rate cuts could continue to generate optimism in the stock markets for a few months yet. Moreover, it suggests that the Fed will not hesitate to act quickly – as it did last year during the regional bank debacle – in the event of a significant deterioration in economic activity, thereby reducing the risk of a financial accident.

Against this backdrop, the manager favours a neutral position within his tactical asset allocation, with the upside potential appearing relatively balanced between equities and bonds. In terms of geographic weighting within equities, the fund has upgraded emerging markets to neutral, reducing the EAFE region to be more in line with the trend reversal indicated by the team's quantitative model. As a result, the fund's geographic allocation is now overweight U.S. stocks against Canada and the EAFE region, as the S&P 500's sector allocation is better aligned to perform in the current market environment.

Related Party Transactions

National Bank of Canada ("the Bank") and its affiliated companies' roles and responsibilities related to the Portfolio are as follows:

Trustee, Custodian and Registrar

Natcan Trust Company ("NTC"), a direct or indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, is the Portfolio's trustee. In this capacity, it is the legal owner of the Portfolio's investments.

NTC also acts as the Portfolio's custodian, registrar and transfer agent. The Manager pays NTC for its services as custodian based on the assets held by the Portfolio. In addition, a flat fee per transaction is paid to NTC. With respect to the registrar and transfer agent services for the Portfolio, a fixed annual amount is paid to NTC by the Manager.

Agent for securities lending transactions

NTC acts as the agent for securities lending transactions acts on behalf of the Portfolio in administering securities lending transactions entered into by the Portfolio. NTC is an affiliate of the Manager.

Manager

As described in the *Management Fees* section, the Portfolio pays annual management fees to National Bank Investments Inc. (the "Manager") in consideration for management services. The management fees cover mainly the Manager's costs of managing the Portfolio's investments. The Manager is an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of National Bank of Canada (the "Bank").

Since October 29, 2013, the Manager pays the operating expenses of the Portfolio other than its "portfolio costs" (defined below) (the "variable operating expenses"), in exchange for the Portfolio's payment to the Manager of annual fixed-rate administration fees with respect to each series of the Portfolio.

The administration fees are equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each series of the Portfolio, calculated and paid in the same manner as the Portfolio's management fees. The variable operating expenses payable by the Manager include, but are not limited to: transfer agency and recordkeeping costs; custodial costs; accounting and valuation fees; audit fees and legal fees; costs of preparing and distributing financial reports, simplified prospectuses, annual information forms, fund facts, continuous disclosure material and other securityholder communications; and costs of trustee services relating to registered tax plans, as applicable.

In addition to administration fees, the Portfolio shall also pay certain portfolio costs, namely: taxes (including, but not limited to, GST/HST and income taxes); costs of compliance with any changes to existing governmental or regulatory requirements introduced after August 1, 2013; costs of compliance with any new governmental or regulatory requirements, including any new fees introduced after August 1, 2013; interest and borrowing costs; costs related to external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as at August 1, 2013; Independent Review Committee costs, including compensation paid to IRC members, travel expenses, insurance premiums and costs associated with their continuing education; and variable operating expenses incurred outside of the normal course of business of the Meritage Portfolios.

The Manager may, from time to time and at its sole discretion, decide to absorb a portion of a series' management fees, administration fees or Portfolio costs.

Portfolio Manager

The Manager has appointed National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, as the portfolio manager for the Portfolio. A flat fee is payable annually to NBT for its management services.

Distribution and Dealer Compensation

Portfolio securities are offered by National Bank Direct Brokerage (a division of National Bank Financial Inc., an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of the Bank), CABN Investments (a division of National Bank Investments Inc.), National Bank Financial Inc. and other affiliated entities. Each month, brokers receive a commission representing a percentage of the average daily value of the securities held by their clients. In addition, when Advisor Series securities are purchased, brokers usually receive a commission, which varies depending on the sales charge option chosen at the time of investment.

Holdings

As at June 30, 2024, National Bank Investments Inc. held 245.87 Portfolio securities for a value of \$2,318.55, which represented close to than 0.0021% of the net asset value of the Portfolio at that date. Transactions between National Bank Investments Inc. and the Portfolio were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Portfolio's net asset value as at the transaction date.

Administrative and Operating Services

NBT provides the Portfolio with certain services, including accounting, reporting and portfolio valuation services. The costs incurred for these services are paid by the Manager to NBT.

Management Fees

The Portfolio pays annual management fees to the Manager in consideration for management, portfolio advisory and administrative services and facilities required by the Portfolio in its day-to-day operations. As the Portfolio invests in underlying funds, the fees and expenses payable in connection with the management of the underlying funds are in addition to those payable by the Portfolio. However, the Manager makes sure that the Portfolio does not pay any management (or operating) fees that, to a reasonable person, would duplicate a fee payable by the underlying fund for the same service.

The management fees are calculated as a fixed percentage of the Portfolio's daily net asset value, are accrued on a daily basis and are paid monthly. The Portfolio is required to pay applicable taxes on the management fees.

Under the heading *Distribution*, expenses include the broker's compensation consisting of the maximum annual trailer fees and sales commissions paid to brokers. Under the heading *Other*, the fees relate mainly to investment management, investment advisory services, general administration and profit. The breakdown of the main services received in consideration for the management fees, as a percentage of the management fees collected from the Portfolio, is as follows:

The criteria for approval may include the size of the investment, the expected level of account activity and the investor's total investments with NBII. No management fees are charged to the portfolio with respect to the O Series units. Management fees are negotiated with and paid directly by investors and are in addition to the fixed-rate administration fee. NBII does not pay any commissions or service fees to dealers who sell O Series units. There are no sales charges payable by investors who purchase O Series units.


Past Performance

The higher a portfolio's turnover rate in an accounting period, the greater the trading costs payable by the Portfolio in the accounting period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the accounting period. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Portfolio.
