Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended June 30, 2021, the NBI Presumed Sound Investments Fund's Investor Series units returned 1.36% compared to 2.70% for the Fund's blended benchmark. The broad-based indices, the Morningstar Canada Liquid Bond Index (CAD) and the Morningstar Canada Large-Mid Index (CAD), returned -3.16% and 17.40% respectively. Unlike the indices, the Fund's performance is calculated after fees and expenses. Please see the *Past Performance* section for the returns of all of the Fund's series, which may vary mainly because of fees and expenses.

The Fund's net asset value rose by 2.90% over the period, from \$183.01 million as at December 31, 2020 to \$188.32 million as at June 30, 2021.

Global equity markets generated strong gains during the first half of 2021, bolstered by the success of vaccination campaigns, abundant monetary and fiscal stimulus, and the reopening of economies. Bonds, on the other hand, endured a more difficult period, as a recovery in economic activity and rising inflation pushed Treasury yields off their historic lows.

In this risk-on environment, the Canadian dollar strengthened as the Bank of Canada adopted a relatively more hawkish tone and crude oil prices increased markedly. Meanwhile, gold prices edged lower, weighed down by a generally stronger U.S. dollar and slightly higher real yields.

In equity markets, value-oriented names outperformed higher growth stocks as investors continued to favour more cyclical sectors, although this trend partly reversed in the latter part of the 6-month period. During the first half of the year, these circumstances proved especially beneficial to the Canadian stock market, the top-performing region in the world. All sectors posted gains, except for the Materials sector. While the Energy sector led the way (+37%), Financials, Health Care, Real Estate, and Information Technology generated over 20%. The strength of the Energy sector was also a major contributor to U.S. equities, as were the Real Estate and Financial Services sectors. Finally, after a good start, emerging markets lagged their peers as a stronger greenback and an apparent slowdown in Chinese growth dampened investors' sentiment for the region.

On the fixed income front, the upward movement in interest rates dampened the overall bond performance for the six-month period. However, high yield bonds stood out with gains for the period while long-term securities generated the lowest returns. In Canada, the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index ended the period down 3.5%, with corporate bonds outperforming provincial, municipal and federal bonds. Within corporate bonds, issuers rated AAA/AA and BBB outperformed those rated A. On a sector basis, Financials, Real Estate and asset-backed securities outperformed, while infrastructure and communications lagged.

For their part, Canadian preferred shares also had a strong six months, with a return of 14.30%. Investors showed strong interest in this asset class due to the scarcity of available securities caused by issuers redeeming shares in favour of LRCN issues and the low volume of new issues.

In this context, the Fund underperformed its blended benchmark for the semester. Among the various asset classes held by the Fund, equities posted higher returns than fixed income assets for the period.

By analyzing the attribution of performance, the Funds that benefited the most to the overall portfolio's performance were the NBI High Conviction Equity Private Portfolio and the NBI Preferred Equity Fund which outperformed their respective benchmark.

Conversely, the NBI Corporate Bond Fund was the main detractor, as it has been negatively impacted by the rising rate environment, especially in Q1.

Recent Developments

Overall, the base-case scenario assumes a sharp recovery in economic activity driven by a significant reduction in the constraints imposed by the pandemic, strong upward pressure on prices, and the maintenance of an accommodative stance by major central banks. Accordingly, a pro-risk positioning with an overweight in emerging markets is favoured in such context.

As the summer progresses and some form of normalcy sets in, economic data will likely continue to produce surprises given that there is simply no precedent in modern history to provide meaningful insight into a post-pandemic world. Investors should therefore not be surprised if the next few months bring episodes of increased volatility. However, measures of market sentiment do not indicate an excess of optimism, which suggests a limited downside risk for stocks.

Going forward, a crucial element to watch will be the evolution of the Federal Reserve's guidance in tandem with the labour market recovery. For now, bond markets appear to be standing exactly where the Fed wants them, but for this to remain the case, the U.S. Central Bank will have to strike the right balance between coherence, credibility, and predictability, which is no easy task. Well aware of the challenges ahead, investors should, however, expect central bankers to exercise great caution in the process.

At the end of the semester, the Fund was underweight in the NBI Corporate Bond Fund and the NBI Global Real Assets Income Fund while being overweight the NBI Preferred Equity Fund.

On April 30, 2021, the Fund's independent review committee (the "IRC") was reduced to three members when Yves Julien resigned as IRC member. On May 1, 2021, the Fund's IRC was increased to four members when Paul Béland was appointed as IRC member.

Related Party Transactions

National Bank of Canada ("the Bank") and its affiliated companies' roles and responsibilities related to the Fund are as follows:

Trustee

National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), a wholly-owned indirect subsidiary of the Bank, is the Fund's trustee. In this capacity, it is the legal owner of the Fund's investments.

Custodian and Registrar

Natcan Trust Company ("NTC") acts as registrar for the Fund's securities and the names of securityholders. NTC also acts as the Fund's custodian. The fees for NTC's custodial services are based on the standard rates in effect at NTC.

Agent for securities lending transactions

NTC acts as the agent for securities lending transactions acts on behalf of the Fund in administering securities lending transactions entered into by the Fund. NTC is an affiliate of the Manager.

Fund Manager

The Fund is managed by National Bank Investments Inc. ("NBII"), which is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank. Therefore, NBII provides or ensures the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund's current operations, including investment consulting, the arrangement of brokerage contracts for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio, bookkeeping and other administrative services required by the Fund.

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund other than its "Fund costs" (defined below) (the "variable operating expenses"), in exchange for the Fund's payment to the Manager of annual fixed-rate administration fees with respect to each series of the Fund.

The administration fees are equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each series of the Fund, calculated and paid in the same manner as the Fund's management fees. The variable operating expenses payable by the Manager include, but are not limited to: transfer agency and recordkeeping costs; custodial costs; accounting and valuation fees; audit fees and legal fees; costs of preparing and distributing financial reports, simplified prospectuses, annual information forms, Fund Facts, continuous disclosure material and other securityholder communications; and costs of trustee services relating to registered tax plans, as applicable.

In addition to administration fees, the Fund shall also pay certain Fund costs, namely: taxes (including, but not limited to, GST/HST and income taxes); costs of compliance with any changes to existing governmental or regulatory requirements introduced after August 1, 2013; costs of compliance with any new governmental or regulatory requirements, including any new fees introduced after August 1, 2013; interest and borrowing costs; costs related to external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as at August 1, 2013; Independent Review Committee costs, including compensation paid to IRC members, travel expenses, insurance premiums and costs associated with their continuing education; and variable operating expenses incurred outside of the normal course of business of the Fund.

The Manager may, from time to time and at its sole discretion, decide to absorb a portion of a series' management fees, administration fees or Fund costs.

As described under the heading *Management Fees*, the Fund pays annual management fees to NBII as consideration for its services.

Portfolio Manager

The Manager has appointed National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), an indirect wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank, as the portfolio manager for the Fund. A flat fee is payable annually to NBT for its management services.

Distribution and Dealer Compensation

NBII acts as principal distributor for the Fund. In this capacity, NBII buys, sells and swaps securities through Bank branches and the National Bank Investments Advisory Service in Canadian provinces and territories, and through external registered representatives. Fund securities are also offered by National Bank Financial Inc. (including its division National Bank Direct Brokerage), CABN Investments (a division of NBII) and other affiliated entities. Brokers may receive, depending on the distributed series, a monthly commission representing a percentage of the average daily value of the securities held by their clients.

Brokerage Fees

The Fund may pay broker's commissions at market rates to a corporation affiliated with NBII. The brokerage fees paid by the Fund for the period are as follows:

Holdings

As at June 30, 2021, National Bank Investments Inc. held 110.28 Fund securities for a value of \$1,121.53, which represented close to 0.0007% of the net asset value of the Fund at that date. Transactions between National Bank Investments Inc. and the Fund were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Fund's net asset value as at the transaction date.

As at June 30, 2021, National Bank Trust Inc. held 1.11 Fund securities for a value of \$13.44, which represented close to 0.0000% of the net asset value of the Fund at that date. Transactions between National Bank Trust Inc. and the Fund were carried out in the normal course of business and at the Fund's net asset value as at the transaction date.

Registered Plan Trust Services

NTC receives a fixed amount per registered account for services provided as trustee for registered plans.

Administrative and Operating Services

The provision of certain services was delegated by the Fund Manager, NBII, to National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), a wholly-owned indirect subsidiary of the Bank. These include accounting, reporting and portfolio valuation services. The fees incurred for these services are paid to NBT by the Fund manager.

Management Fees

The Fund pays annual management fees to the Fund manager for its management services. The fees are calculated based on a percentage of the Fund's daily net asset value before applicable taxes and are paid on a monthly basis. A portion of the management fees paid by the Fund covers maximum annual trailer fees and sales commissions paid to brokers. The remainder of the management fees primarily covers investment management and general administration services. The breakdown of major services provided in consideration of the management fees, expressed as an approximate percentage of the management fees is as follows:

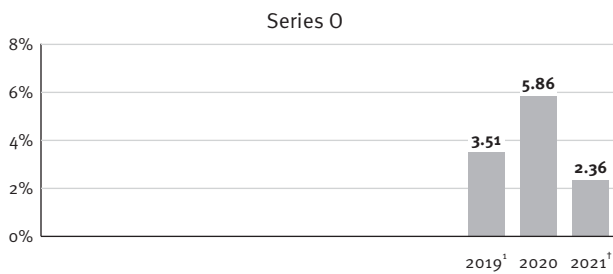
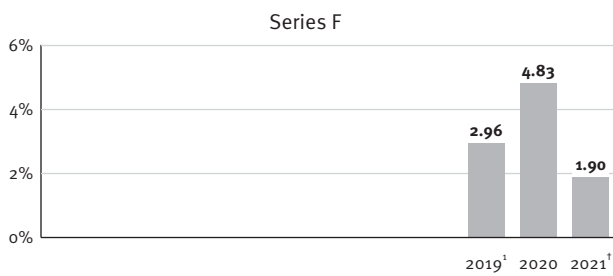

The higher a Fund's portfolio turnover rate in an accounting period, the greater the trading costs payable by the Fund in the accounting period, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the accounting period. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Fund.
