Management Discussion of Fund Performance

Investment Objective and Strategies

The NBI Jarislowsky Fraser Select Income Fund's investment objective is to provide regular income and to achieve moderate capital growth by investing, directly and indirectly, in a diversified portfolio comprised primarily of Canadian fixed income and equity securities.

The portfolio manager analyzes investment-grade fixed income securities denominated in Canadian or foreign currency and invests this portion of the fund mainly in corporate and government bonds. The Fund may also invest in equity securities, such as common and preferred shares and the portfolio manager selects mainly high quality equities of Canadian issuers. The Fund may invest approximately 30% of its net assets in equity or fixed income securities of foreign issuers.

Risks

The global investment risk of the Fund remains as described in the simplified prospectus or any amendments thereto and Fund Facts.

Results of Operations

For the twelve-month period ended December 31, 2022, the NBI Jarislowsky Fraser Select Income Fund's Advisor Series units returned -10.21% compared to -9.55% for the Fund's blended benchmark. The broad-based index, the Morningstar Canada Liquid Bond Index (CAD), returned -10.97%. Unlike the indices, the Fund's performance is calculated after fees and expenses. Please see the *Past Performance* section for the returns of all of the Fund's series, which may vary mainly because of fees and expenses.

The Fund's net asset value dropped by 23.53% over the period, from \$208.73 million as at December 31, 2021 to \$159.61 million as at December 31, 2022.

The decline stemmed mainly from net redemptions by unitholders of the Fund and market fluctuations.

With the Russian invasion of Ukraine, record inflation, and potential recession on the horizon; it's fair to say that 2022 has proven to be challenging on many fronts. For investors, this context has resulted in declines for stocks and bonds in the first half of the year, followed by six months of ups and downs with no clear direction.

In this context of uncertainty and rising rates, global equities (-12.0% for the MSCI World C\$) have performed similarly to traditional Canadian bonds (-11.7% for the FTSE Canada Universe) in 2022, although for fixed income, this represents their worst annual performance in history. In terms of leadership, Canadian equities (-5.8% for the S&P/TSX) did significantly better than their peers, supported in part by generally high commodity prices. On the other hand, the environment was more difficult in emerging markets (-19.7% for the MSCI EM Index in US\$), held back by slowing global growth, containment in China, strong U.S. dollar, and increasingly restrictive monetary policies.

Within fixed income, segments with longer duration suffered the most (-21.5% for the FTSE Canada Long Index), a direct consequence of the substantial rate hikes delivered by most central banks.

In this context, the Fund underperformed the benchmark for the period. Stock selection in Healthcare and Information Technology positively impacted performance. The Fund's combined underweight position and stock selection in Energy negatively impacted performance.

Recent Developments

The outlook for financial markets includes a combination of fundamental and valuation factors. Looking at valuations first, the farther out the time horizon, the greater the correlation between the current valuation and market returns. For example, the 10-year US equity market returns are correlated with current measures of valuation by over 80%. Current valuations suggest roughly a 4% return for the US stock market, although it would be closer to 8% for other markets given their more favourable valuations.

This is by no means an exact science as the small, non-correlated portions can throw returns projections off by a considerable amount and there is obviously some variability around the average number, but it is a good starting point for any discussion about future returns. Long-term returns for bonds are a bit easier to calculate as high-quality bonds will essentially earn their yield-to-maturity.

Economic fundamentals are a notoriously tricky set of factors to use as a guide for future return estimates, especially the farther out one looks. For the current business cycle, inflation pressures have appeared to peak -- the rate of change is now much lower over monthly time frames vs. longer time frames, such as six months or one year. What is difficult to predict is how fast or how far inflation will decline. The unusual shortage of available labour is unique to this cycle and is contributing to a more resilient labour market, which makes a central banker's job more challenging.

Inflation and labour markets are lagging indicators, and, with long leading indicators still in recessionary territory, we expect that it will eventually translate into declining wage pressures. Monetary policy has become less stimulative and, depending on how you measure it, even restrictive. Inverted yield curves, such as the one we have now, are typically reliable signals that central bank policy stances are restrictive.

Overall, the economic fundamentals are pointing to a headwind for equity markets in the near term. Given that the stock market is a leading indicator in and of itself, some of these economic headwinds are already priced into markets. What investors must decide is whether this margin of safety is enough. The portfolio manager argues that to some extent they have but there is possibly more to go. This may provide good buying opportunities for long-term investors like us, and for this reason, we continue to watch for investment prospects at better entry points.

On February 28, 2022, the benchmark was modified to better reflect the categories of assets in which the Fund invests. The previous blended benchmark was composed of the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index (CAD) (75 %) and the S&P/TSX Capped Composite Index (CAD) (25%). The previous broad-based index was the FTSE Canada Universe Bond Index (CAD).

On April 30, 2022, the Fund's independent review committee (the "IRC") was reduced to three members when Robert Martin resigned as IRC member. On May 1, 2022, the Fund's IRC was increased to four members when Line Deslandes was appointed as IRC member. However, on September 30, 2022, the Fund's IRC was reduced to three members when Line Deslandes resigned as IRC member.

On May 20, 2022, NBI discontinued the purchase offering of deferred sales charge and low sales charge purchase options for all new investments, including purchases made through systematic plans in all Canadian jurisdictions. Investors who purchased units under these sales charge options will continue to be subject to the redemption fee schedules under which they were purchased.

Related Party Transactions

National Bank of Canada ("the Bank") and its affiliated companies' roles and responsibilities related to the Fund are as follows:

Fund Manager

The Fund is managed by National Bank Investments Inc. ("NBII"), which is a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Bank. Therefore, NBII provides or ensures the provision of all general management and administrative services required by the Fund's current operations, including investment consulting, the arrangement of brokerage contracts for the purchase and sale of the investment portfolio, bookkeeping and other administrative services required by the Fund.

The Manager pays the operating expenses of the Fund other than its "Fund costs" (defined below) (the "variable operating expenses"), in exchange for the Fund's payment to the Manager of annual fixed-rate administration fees with respect to each series of the Fund.

The administration fees are equal to a specified percentage of the net asset value of each series of the Fund, calculated and paid in the same manner as the Fund's management fees. The variable operating expenses payable by the Manager include, but are not limited to: transfer agency and recordkeeping costs; custodial costs; accounting and valuation fees; audit fees and legal fees; costs of preparing and distributing financial reports, simplified prospectuses, annual information forms, Fund Facts, continuous disclosure material and other securityholder communications; and costs of trustee services relating to registered tax plans, as applicable.

In addition to administration fees, the Fund shall also pay certain Fund costs, namely: taxes (including, but not limited to, GST/HST and income taxes); costs of compliance with any changes to existing governmental or regulatory requirements introduced after August 1, 2013; costs of compliance with any new governmental or regulatory requirements, including any new fees introduced after August 1, 2013; interest and borrowing costs; costs related to external services that were not commonly charged in the Canadian mutual fund industry as at August 1, 2013; Independent Review Committee costs, including compensation paid to IRC members, travel expenses, insurance premiums and costs associated with their continuing education; and variable operating expenses incurred outside of the normal course of business of the Fund.

The Manager may, from time to time and at its sole discretion, decide to absorb a portion of a series' management fees, administration fees or Fund costs.

As described under the heading *Management Fees*, the Fund pays annual management fees to NBII as consideration for its services.

Distribution and Dealer Compensation

Fund securities are offered by National Bank Direct Brokerage (a division of National Bank Financial Inc., an indirect wholly owned subsidiary of the Bank), CABN Investments (a division of NBII), National Bank Financial Inc. and other affiliated entities. Each month, brokers receive a commission representing a percentage of the average daily value of the securities held by their clients.

Brokerage Fees

The Fund may pay broker's commissions at market rates to a corporation affiliated with NBII. The brokerage fees paid by the Fund for the period are as follows:

Independent Review Committee Approvals and Recommendations

The Fund followed the standing instructions of its Independent Review Committee with respect to one or more of the following transactions:

- Purchasing or holding the securities of a related issuer, in particular, those of National Bank of Canada;
- Investing in the securities of an issuer when an entity related to the manager acts as an underwriter for the placement or at any time during the 60-day period after the end of the placement;
- Purchasing or selling securities to another investment fund managed by the manager or a company in the same group;
- Purchasing or selling debt securities on the secondary market, through related brokers that are main brokers in the Canadian debt securities market (in accordance with an exemption received from the Canadian Securities Administrators);
- Entering into foreign exchange transactions (including both spot transactions and forward transactions) with National Bank of Canada.

The manager has implemented policies and procedures to make sure that the conditions applicable to each of the above transactions are met. The applicable standing instructions require that these transactions be carried out in accordance with NBI policies, which specify, in particular, that investment decisions pertaining to these related party transactions must be made free from any influence by an entity related to NBI and without taking into account any consideration relevant to an entity related to NBI. Furthermore, the investment decisions must represent the business judgment of the securities advisor, uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interest of the Fund and must achieve a fair and reasonable result for the Fund.

Registered Plan Trust Services

NTC receives a fixed amount per registered account for services provided as trustee for registered plans.

Administrative and Operating Services

The provision of certain services was delegated by the Fund manager, NBII, to National Bank Trust Inc. ("NBT"), a wholly-owned indirect subsidiary of the Bank. These include accounting, reporting and portfolio valuation services. The fees incurred for these services are paid to NBT by the Fund manager.

Management Fees

The Fund pays annual management fees to the Fund manager for its management services. The fees are calculated based on a percentage of the Fund's daily net asset value before applicable taxes and are paid on a monthly basis. Under the *Distribution* heading, expenses include the broker's compensation consisting of the maximum annual trailer fees and sales commissions paid to brokers. Under the *Other* heading, the fees relate mainly to investment management, investment advisory services, general administration and profit. The breakdown of major services provided in consideration of the management fees, expressed as an approximate percentage of the management fees is as follows:

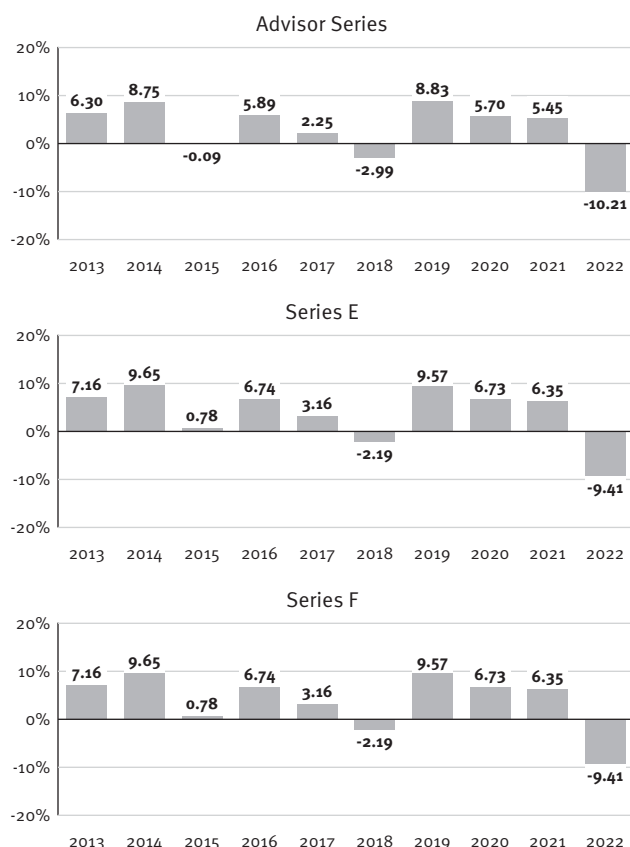

Past Performance

Index Descriptions

The **Morningstar Canada Liquid Bond Index** offers diversified exposure to federal debt securities guaranteed by the federal government, to provincial debt securities guaranteed by the provincial government and to corporate debt securities denominated in Canadian dollars in order to maintain liquidity. Small issuances, issuances with limited terms and issuances with credit ratings lower than those of investment-grade securities are excluded from the index.

The **S&P/TSX Capped Composite Index** is a subset of the S&P/TSX and reflects share price fluctuations of a group of companies listed on the Toronto Stock Exchange (TSX) and weighted by market capitalization.

The blended benchmark was modified to better reflect the categories of assets in which the Fund invests. The information related to the previous blended benchmark is presented below.
